**RECORD OF THE MINUTES OF THE  
SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS  
April 2, 2008**

**1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, Invocation, Roll Call- President Chatigny**

President Chatigny called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m., 560 Magnolia Avenue, Beaumont, California. Those responding to roll call were President Chatigny, Vice President Lash, Director Dopp and Director Ball. Absent to this meeting was Director Parks. Also present at this meeting were the General Manager, C.J. Butcher, Assistant General Manager, Anthony Lara and Legal Counsel, Gerald Shoaf. President Chatigny led the pledge and Vice President Lash recited the invocation.

**2. Adoption and Adjustment of Agenda (additions and/or deletions)**

Vice President Lash moved to approve the agenda as presented. Director Dopp seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

**3. Public Input**

No public comment was presented at this time.

**4. Action Items**

Ken Al-Iman, C.P.A., provided a slide and a verbal presentation on the District's Audits. Mr. Al-Iman indicated that the purpose of the audits was to provide assurance that the financial statements built upon accounting records are reliable and can give those in charge of the District the information that is needed to fulfill the function and to communicate the financial statistics of the District. Mr. Al-Iman explained the areas of concern and recommendations were submitted in a letter to the District. In conclusion, he stated that Mayer Hoffman and McCann had performed all the auditing procedures required by the auditing standards, were able to provide their opinion without qualification and that the District's records and the financial statements built upon the District's records conform to U.S. Government accounting standards.

President Chatigny invited Sharon Hamilton to address the Board on the recently completed District's audits. Sharon Hamilton questioned Mr. Al-Iman regarding there being no receipts or explanation for expenses and the possibility that IRS question this. She also questioned the "cost analysis project" needed to be presented to the Board. She further questioned the Purchase Policy recommendation and the used tax table.

President Chatigny invited Luwana Ryan to address the Board on the audits. Mrs. Ryan, a Cherry Valley resident requested clarification on 2006 audit page 17.

a. Acceptance of the 2004 Audit

After discussion, President Chatigny moved to accept the 2004 Audit. Vice President Lash seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

b. Acceptance of the 2005 Audit

d. Resolution 2008-04 Adopting a Reimbursement Resolution as Official Intent of the District in Order to Comply with the Internal Revenue Service Relating to the Qualification for Reimbursement of Project Costs for the Recycled Water Project

President Chatigny invited Luwana Ryan to address the Board on this item. Mrs. Ryan stated that the District's funds are very low and the Board needs to think about the current financial position before approving the 2008-04 Resolution.

President Chatigny invited Frances Flanders to address the Board on this item. Mrs. Flanders recommended that the District wait until the financial situation of the District is better before making a decision on this Resolution.

President Chatigny invited Patsy Reeley to address the Board on this issue. Mrs. Reeley, Cherry Valley, suggested that the Board table this item until the public has a full understanding of the Resolution 2008-04.

General Manager, C.J. Butcher clarified that the District is no longer behind with its audits. He further stated that there was a report that was created by Mr. Pardiwala which defines how the money will be paid back. He explained that the use of recycled water will reduce the use of potable water.

April 09, 2008**

**1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, Invocation, Roll Call- President Chatigny**

President Chatigny called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m., 560 Magnolia Avenue, Beaumont, California. Those responding to roll call were President Chatigny, Vice President Lash, Directors Dopp and Ball. Absent to this meeting was Director Parks. Also present at this meeting were the General Manager, C.J. Butcher, Assistant General Manager, Anthony Lara and Legal Counsel, Gerald Shoaf. President Chatigny led the pledge and Director Ball recited the invocation.

**2. Adoption and Adjustment of Agenda (additions and/or deletions)**

President Chatigny requested deleting Item 6a from the agenda as the Hand Book was not ready to be presented to the full Board.

President Chatigny moved to accept the agenda with the deletion of Item 6a from the agenda. Director Ball seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

**4. Adoption of the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of March 12, 2008**

After no discussion, Vice President Lash moved to approve the March 12, 2008 minutes as presented. Director Dopp seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

President Chatigny invited Luwana Ryan to address the Board on this item. Mrs. Ryan commented on the March 2008 Financial Report not being included in the agenda. She stated that the amount that the District has spent in the building was already over the budget. She further questioned the Board on a board member expense for the Grand Jury stating that this item was not on the list of approved Directors' reimbursements.

After discussion, President Chatigny requested that an item regarding the payment of the stipend for Grand Jury attendance be put on the next agenda for discussion and possible action. Vice President Lash seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

c. Selection of a Director to Serve as the District's JPIA Representative

After Discussion, Director Dopp moved to select Vice President Lash to serve as the Designated JPIA Director. President Chatigny seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

## 7. Discussion Items

- Fishing Derby at Recreation and Recharge site in cooperation with Recreation and Park District – Vice President Lash reported that there was a meeting to take place tomorrow. He reported that there will be prizes for anyone who catches the biggest fish as well as other activities that will take place at this event. Assistant General Manager, Anthony Lara provided a status on the delivery of water to fill up the ponds. General Manager, C.J. Butcher stated that the District will provide employees to secure the ponds during the event.
- Request for Proposals for the Treasurer Position – After a brief discussion and by Legal Counsel, Gerald Shoaf's recommendation, President Chatigny moved to place this item on the next agenda for discussion and possible action. Director Dopp seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Director Parks absent.

## 8. Reports

### a) Directors' Reports

Director Ball reported that he attended the San Geronio Pass Agency's meeting on April 7, 2008. He reported that the San Geronio Pass Agency accepted a consideration Memorandum of Understanding between the Pass and the Beaumont

Cherry Valley Water District for the operation of the Little San Gorgonio Creek on a vote of 6-1. Director Ball further indicated that the Pass Agency stated at this meeting that they had sent an invitation to BCVWD for a tour on the State Project Facilities of Water which the Pass Agency is sponsoring. He reported that the tour will be from May 21 to May 23 of 2008.

#### **b) General Manager's Report**

- Recharge Facility – General Manager, C.J. Butcher reported that the drinking fountains are the only work left to complete
- New Office – General Manager, C.J. Butcher reported that there were some things left to do in the new building like the electrical and some work in the board room.
- Wells 25 and 29 – Assistant General Manager, Anthony Lara reported that the wells are 90% complete, permit amendments were sent out and the wells should go online by June 1<sup>st</sup>.
- District issues – General Manager, C.J. Butcher handed out a memorandum in response to some dissertations made by Director Ball at the last meeting regarding his job performance. He stated that because it was not an item in the agenda he was not given a chance to respond until now. He stated that he talked to Legal Counsel, Gerald Shoaf who instructed him not to read the memorandum aloud but make this document part of a public record.
- Articles from Press Enterprise and the San Bernardino Sun – Vice President Lash stated that these articles were interesting as the projects are similar to the District's Recharge project. President Chatigny congratulated the people that wrote these articles for a job well done.

Director Ball requested that an update on the cost of the building, a sequence of events of the remodeling of the building and a list of bids be provided at the May 2008 meeting.

**1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, Invocation, Roll Call- President Chatigny**

President Chatigny called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m., 560 Magnolia Avenue, Beaumont, California. Those responding to roll call were President Chatigny, Vice President Lash, Directors Dopp, Ball and Parks. Also present at this meeting were the General Manager, C.J. Butcher, Assistant General Manager, Anthony Lara and Legal Counsel, Gerald Shoaf. President Chatigny led the pledge and Vice President Lash recited an invocation.

**2. Adoption and Adjustment of Agenda (additions and/or deletions)**

Director Ball moved to delete Item 6a from the agenda. Motion died for lack of a second.

Director Dopp moved to adopt the agenda as presented. Vice President Lash seconded. The motion passed on a 4-1 vote.

**3. Public Input**

President Chatigny invited Frances Flanders to address the Board on an item not in the agenda. Mrs. Flanders commented on the last page of the 2006 Audit which has "no Facility Charges" figures. She also commented on BCVWD being behind on its Financial Information. She recommended that the Board discuss financial issues when financial information is provided.

**4. Presentation by Ray Martinez, Ray Martinez and Associates and Greg Bollinger Regarding the Breakdown Cost of the New District Headquarters.**

Ray Martinez, Ray Martinez and Associates presented a verbal presentation on the remodeling of the building. Mr. Martinez offered a synopsis of the beginning and the completion of the project. He further explained the selection of the sub contractors for the different phases of the project. Mr. Martinez provided to the Board a report showing the breakdown of the cost.

After lengthy questioning, Mr. Martinez was asked to verify if the total cost of the construction of the new facilities included the demolition of the old building. Mr. Martinez agreed to verify this information and bring back to the Board.

**5. Discussion Regarding District Financial Activity Including Reserves, Operation Expenses and Capital Projects**

President Chatigny invited Luwana Ryan to address the Board on this item. Luwana Ryan, Cherry Valley, California commented that there are items in the financial reports where the District has gone over budget, the recently approved budget. She further commented that the District is spending reserves without Board approval.

President Chatigny invited Frances Flanders to address the Board on this item. Mrs. Flanders commented on public comments about the overspending of the public

funds and use of the restricted funds. She requested that the Board give the financial issues the deserved attention.

General Manager, C.J. Butcher provided a slide presentation and a report on the District Capital Improvement Projects and Expenses for water operations and maintenance. He further explained the locations and areas of service of the different pressure zones. After the presentation, General Manager, C.J. Butcher answered questions from members of the Board.

After a lengthy discussion, Mr. Butcher requested that the Board make requests in writing to Meyer Hoffman McCann for an explanation of the dates shown on the audits as the dates reflect a fiscal year not a calendar year.

## 6. Action Items

### a. Request to amend General Manager's Employment Contract

President Chatigny invited Patsy Reeley to address the Board on this item. Patsy Reeley, Cherry Valley, indicated that the change that Mr. Butcher is requesting be available to other employees. She indicated that the District's only option is to vacate the homes and use them as storage. She expressed her concern on the safety of the District employees and their families. She further indicated that the District can use the saved money on maintenance to start a water reserve for emergencies.

General Manager, C.J. Butcher requested that the Board amend his employment contract to reflect the deletion of Section XII which requires that the General Manager resides in the District residence. He also requested that the Board rescind his housing agreement dated March 2006. He further recommended that the Board establish a policy as to how employees need to respond to emergencies.

President Chatigny appointed Director Parks and himself to an Ad hoc Committee to work on a policy for employees to respond to emergencies in the District's facilities in the canyon.

After Discussion, Director Ball moved to table this item until the Ad hoc Committee brings back a policy with information for the Board. Director Parks seconded. The motion failed by the following roll call:

### **BOARD MEMBERS= COMPENSATION AND EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT POLICY**

#### A. Travel Guidelines

##### 1. Per Diems and Expenses for Conferences

Per diems and expenses will be paid for the period of any conference attended and all conference-related activities scheduled prior to and after the conference, with a reasonable time allowed to travel to and from the conference-related activities. This guideline acknowledges that if early arrival or stay-over is required because of transportation scheduling, per diem and expenses will be paid for that period. Conference lodging expenses shall not exceed the maximum group rate published by the conference or activity sponsor, provided that lodging at the group rate is available to the Board member at the time of booking. If the group rate is not available, the board member shall use comparable lodging. Government and group rates shall be used when available.

##### 2. Travel Expense

Expenses for travel by personal automobile will not exceed those paid to Board members traveling by scheduled airlines to attend the same conference. Reimbursement for mileage will be in accordance with the IRS standard mileage rate.

##### 3. Spousal Expenses

Under no circumstances shall the District prepay or reimburse expenses for a spouse.

##### 4. Meal Reimbursement

Reimbursement for expenses for Directors' meals (not including spouse or guest) will not exceed Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per day, including a limit of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) for the dinner meal, with the remainder reimbursable for other meals during the same day will be prepaid or reimbursed when traveling at District expense for conferences, seminars and/or business meetings.

##### 5. Expense Claim Forms, Receipts

Claims for expense reimbursement shall be made by use of the Expense Claim Form provided by the District, and all claims will require receipts. In the event

that a receipt is not obtained or is lost, an explanation of expenditure shall be included on the Expense Claim Form and approved by the Board for payment.

6. Unused Prepaid Expenses

If claimant expenses are prepaid by the District and are not used, the District will require reimbursement unless the reason for not attending was due to personal illness or an event that impeded good faith efforts to attend. Such events could include flight or other public transportation delays or cancellations, meeting cancellations or date changes, or sudden events within Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District which would serve the Districts best interest that the individual not be away.

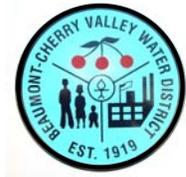
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When the District service area was originally approved for organization in 1919, it did not include land then owned by the Beaumont Land and Water Company in Riverside and San Bernardino County. In 1920, the Beaumont Irrigation District (BID) predecessor to the Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District (District) bought all of the holdings of the BID including the land holdings north of Cherry Valley. Since the original purchase of the BID property, land has been added in 1926 (Warren Ranch) and later in 1931 (Fick Ranch).

Over the years, some property was sold by the BID/District, however approximately 2,800 acres remains in the District's possession. This land is located in both Riverside and San Bernardino Counties with the Riverside County portion being annexed in the last few years.

The annexation application was required in San Bernardino County LAFCO so that it would not hold up the Riverside County LAFCO Annexation that included approximately 35 or 36 parcels and or areas of the District.

The Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District (District or BCVWD) proposes to annex approximately 588 acres of land in unincorporated San Bernardino County and a portion of the City of Yucaipa within the District's service boundaries. The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), as established by the statute (Public Resources Code §§ 21000 *et seq.*), requires that the environmental implications of an action by a local agency be estimated and evaluated before project approval. This Initial Study has been prepared in accordance with Section 15365 of CEQA Guidelines (14 Cal. Code Reg. 1500 *et seq.*). This Initial Study provides the assessment for a determination of whether the project may have a significant effect on the environment.

- 4. Project Location** The Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District is located in Riverside County with a portion of its service area in San Bernardino County. The District boundaries reflect the geographical area where the District is currently providing potable water. The service area of the District encompasses a majority of the City of Beaumont and the community of Cherry Valley, as shown on Figure 1. In support of ongoing development, and in accordance with the Riverside and San Bernardino County Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCO) determinations, the District is responsible for providing water service to a larger planning area or sphere of influence (Figure 1).

The Proposed Project is located in Edgar Canyon primarily within the unincorporated area of San Bernardino County. A small portion of land is within the City of Yucaipa. The Proposed Project would be within the District's sphere of influence and service area boundaries north of the City of Beaumont. The location of the parcels to be annexed is shown on Figure 2. The project area is primarily undeveloped with the exception of three houses owned by the District.

8. **Description of the Proposed Project** The District is applying to annex ten parcels of District-owned land in order to maintain control of the groundwater quality of existing wells in the District, provide wellhead protection around existing wells, and to more efficiently manage the District facilities. As one of the requirements for completing the annexation process, a Plan of Services is required. The purpose of a Plan of Services is to provide information for evaluation as to: (1) the ability of the District to provide service in a cost-effective manner; and, (2) to ensure the area to be annexed will receive benefit from the planned extension of service. The Plan of Services is also required to meet the requirements of Senate Bill No. 221 (“Kuehl”) which stipulates that legislative bodies of a city, county, or public water system provide written verification that a sufficient water supply is available prior to completion of a project/subdivision and Senate Bill No. 610 (“Costa”) which requires the water supplier to prepare a water supply assessment. Table 1 provides information on the ten parcels to be included in the proposed annexation.

The Proposed Project would not require any construction of water facilities to support existing facilities at this time. This annexation would not require additional potable or recycled water system improvements. Typically a legal transaction, annexation generally refers to the inclusion of newly incorporated land, but can involve the transfer of land from one public agency to another. Annexation is the means by which an existing public agency extends its corporate boundaries. Most of the property currently served by the District is annexed to the District, however, a limited number of parcels of land have not been annexed although water service to these parcels is being provided by the District.

The Proposed Project would result in the incorporation of 588.29 acres of District-owned land into the District's service area. This would not result in a change in the District's service area boundary. The area proposed for annexation is within the District's current Sphere of Influence (Figure 2). The annexation area would consist of relatively mountainous terrain within the entire area. Annexation would require the following:

- Preparation and approval of a Plan of Services by the District, however, a Plan of Services is not required for the Proposed Project because there would be no new or planned water services to the area;
- Preparation and adoption of CEQA documentation by the District;
- Adoption of a Waiver of Conducting Authority Proceedings Resolution by the District for submittal to the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO); and,
- Approval by LAFCO of the annexation.

### **8.1 Background**

The District was formed in 1919 as an irrigation district to provide domestic and irrigation water to the community of Beaumont and surrounding areas. The District operates several wells and reservoirs north of Riverside County in San Bernardino County.

The District has historically diverted surface waters and pumped shallow groundwater in Little San Gorgonio Creek (also called Edgar Canyon) north of Beaumont, and conveyed that water through pipelines to the use areas. As the need for water increased, the District installed additional wells in Edgar Canyon, Noble Canyon (a neighboring canyon to the east) and the Beaumont Basin. At present, the District is not operating their wells in Noble Canyon. Since the early 1900s, the District has captured and extracted much of their supply water from their wells located in Edgar Canyon through percolation of surface flows in District ponds.

### **8.2 Purpose of the Project**

The purpose of the project is to maintain control of the groundwater quality of the District's existing wells, provide wellhead protection, and to manage the District's facilities more efficiently.

### **8.3 Related Projects**

Three projects may occur during annexation of the subject parcels:

- The U.S. Forest Service has proposed the Oak Glen Area Fuel Break Project. This project would create new or enhance existing fire breaks on private and public land identified in the Oak Glen Fireshed Analysis.
- The District plans to modify existing percolation basins in Little San Gorgonio Creek for use as desilting basins. This construction would include a new entry structure, piping and spillways as evaluated in a previous Environmental Impact Report (EIR).
- The Yucaipa Freeway Corridor Specific Plan is a land use, policy and regulatory document to guide the development of the 1,234-acre Yucaipa Freeway Corridor Specific Plan

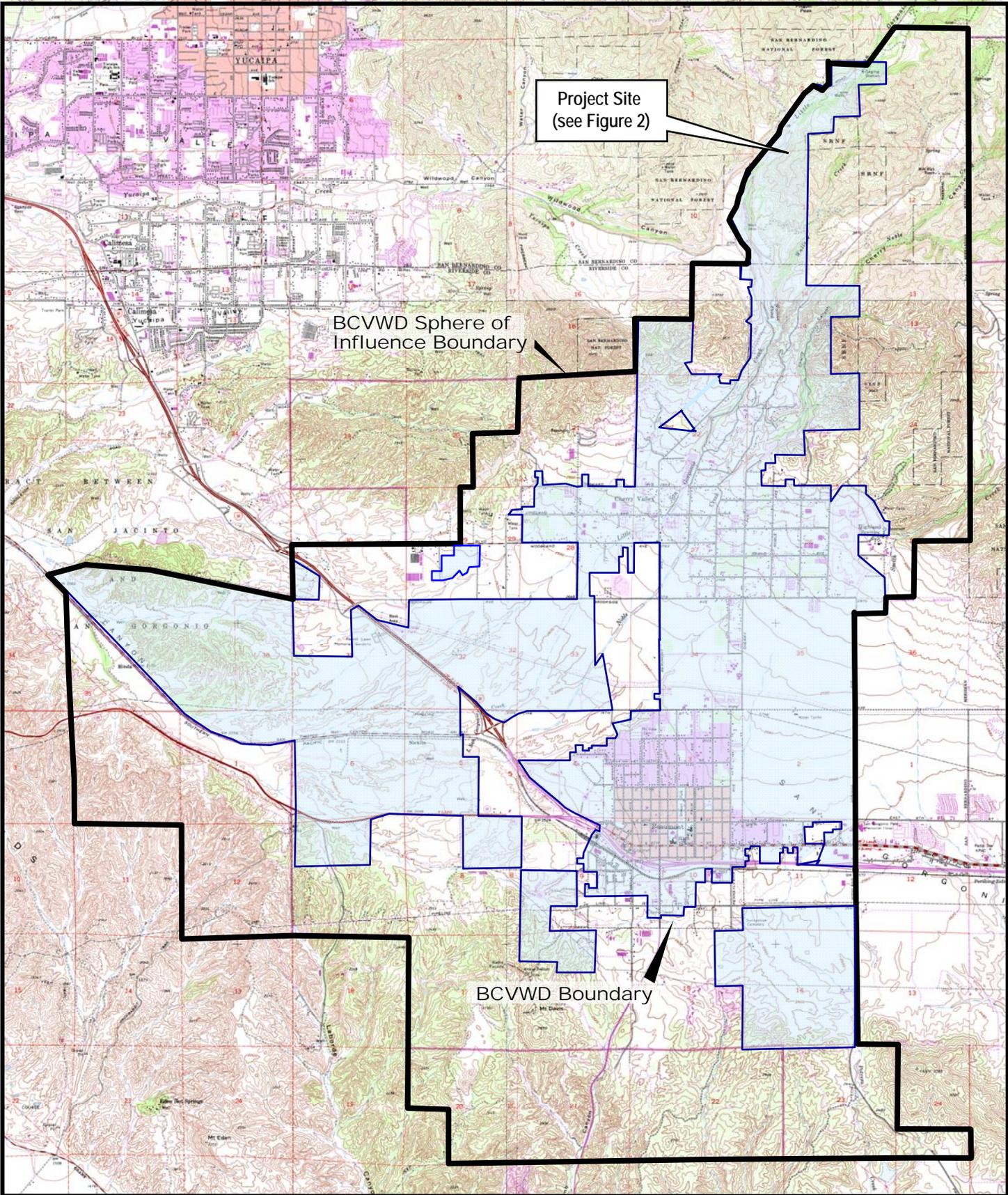
area in the City of Yucaipa. Designated land uses in the Specific Plan include Residential, Community Commercial, Regional Commercial, Business Park, Public Facilities and Open Space. Project area is bisected by Interstate 10 and abuts the Riverside County line to the south. A Draft EIR was released to the public in July 2007.

Other planned projects in the Yucaipa area and the Oak Glen community may be identified in the future. Table 2 identifies known projects in the Cherry Valley community (immediately south of the proposed annexation area), including other annexations to the District. Figure 3 shows the locations of other projects in the area.

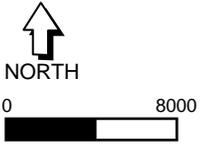

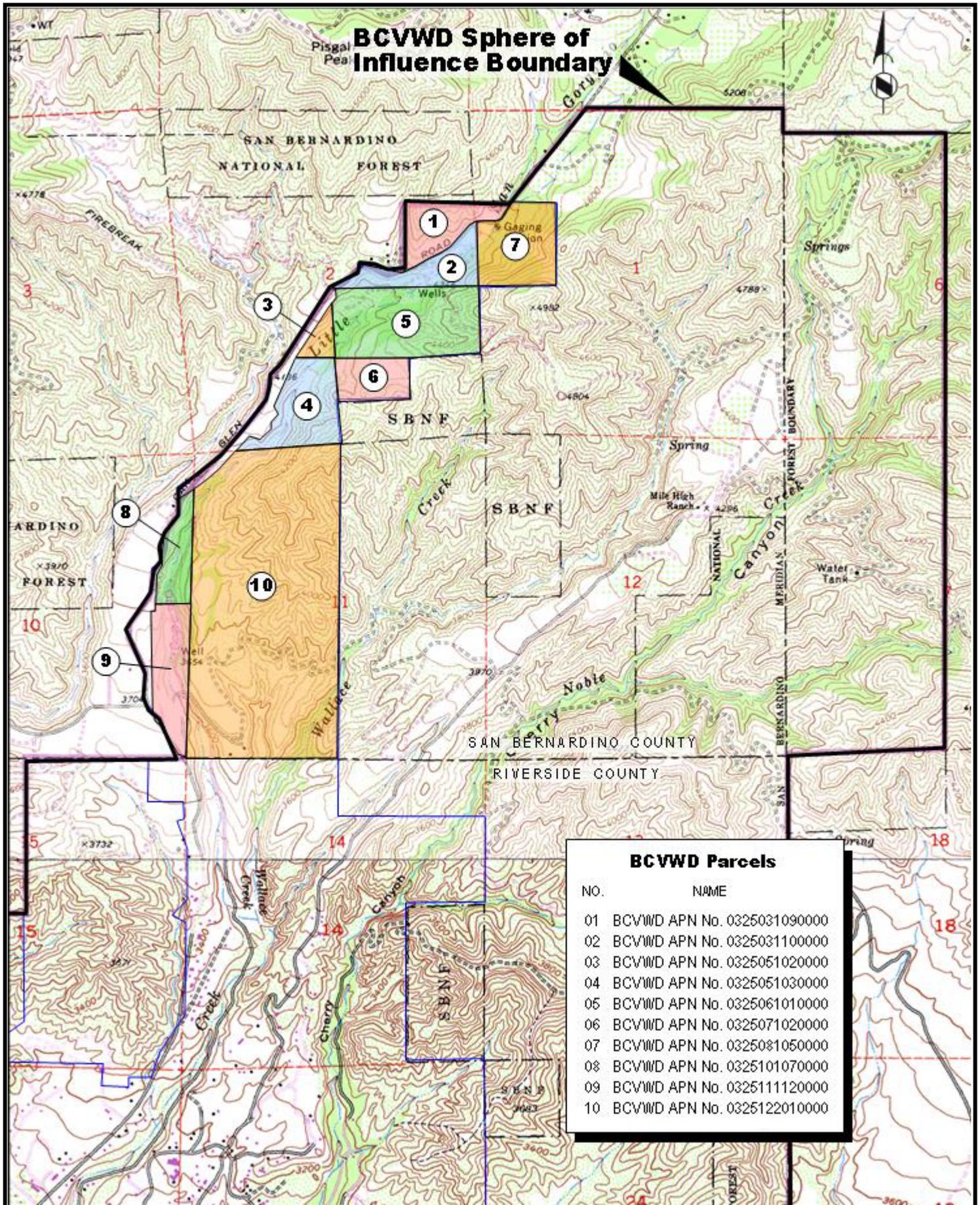

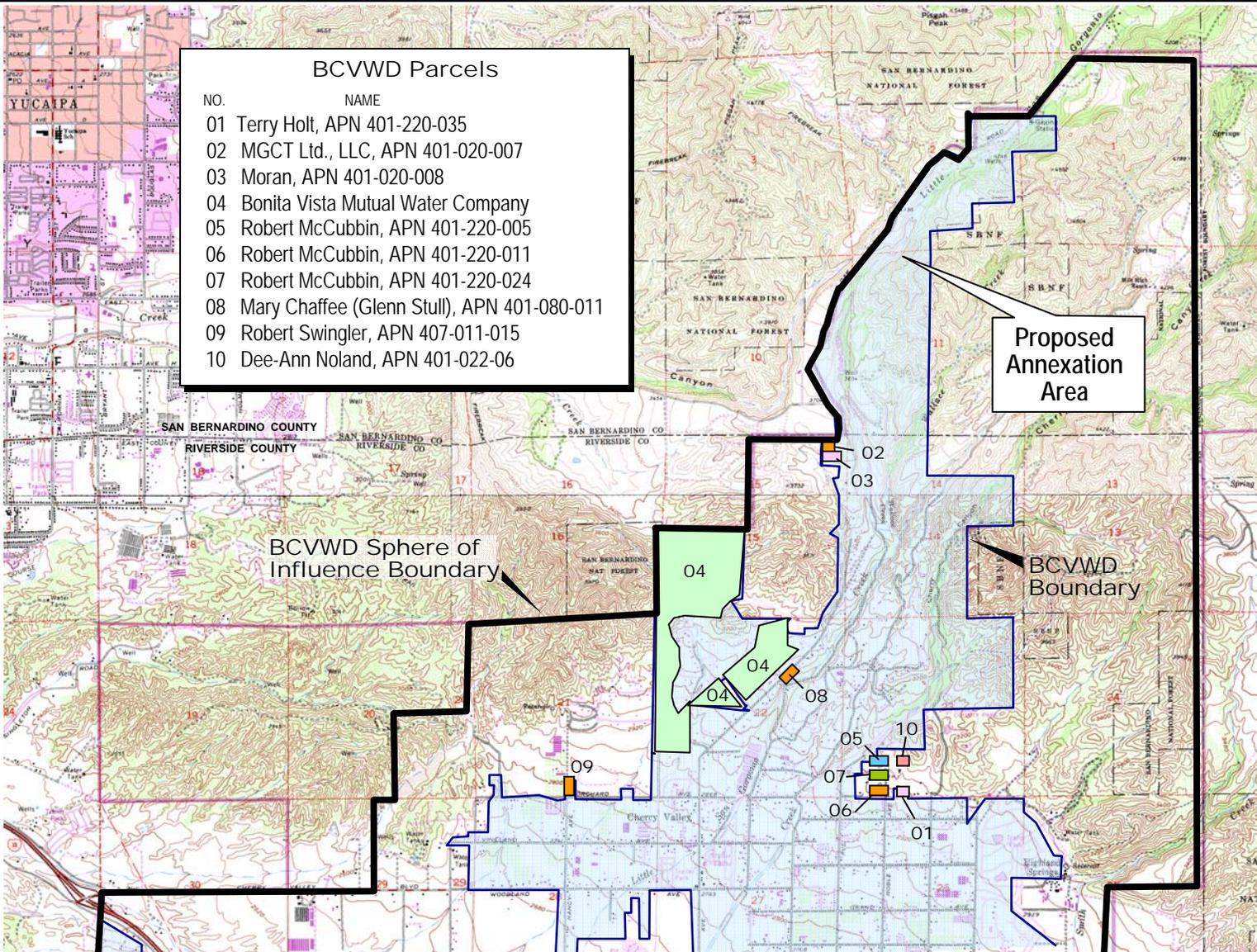

Yucaipa onion has an unlikely potential to occur in the proposed annexation area because of soil preferences. The California Native Plant Society designates this plant as List 1B.1 (rare, threatened and endangered in California and elsewhere) and seriously threatened in California (high degree/immediacy of threat).</li> <li>▪ <b>Plummer's mariposa lily (<i>Calochortus plummerae</i>)</b> was reported in 1996 from an area that includes a portion of proposed annexation Parcel No. 10. This plant is a perennial herb that sprouts from an underground bulb producing tulip-like flowers between May and July. It occurs in chaparral, scrub, and grassland habitats, usually on granitic or alluvial soils. The species is known from Ventura, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, and Riverside Counties. Plummer's mariposa lily may have remained dormant as a result of drought conditions, but is considered to have a high potential to occur in the project area during a normal rainfall year. Plummer's mariposa lily is considered sensitive but is not listed as threatened or endangered at this time. The California Native Plant Society designates this plant as List 1B.2 (rare, threatened and endangered in California and elsewhere) and fairly threatened in California (moderate threat).</li> <li>▪ <b>San Bernardino gilia (<i>Gilia leptantha ssp. leptantha</i>)</b> is a native plant known only from the San Bernardino Mountains. It was last reported in 1931 from an area approximately 0.3 mile north of the proposed annexation site. The California Native Plant Society designates this plant as List 1B.3 (rare, threatened and endangered in California and elsewhere) and not very threatened in California (low threat). This plant is presumed to potentially be present in the annexation area.</li> </ul>				
<p>Although not listed by the CNDDDB, populations of <b>slender-horned spineflower (<i>Dodecahema leptoceras</i>)</b> are known from lower elevations southwest of, and within five miles, of the project area. This species is found in consolidated sands of alluvial outwashes. Slender-horned spineflower is a federal- and state-listed endangered species that occurs in chaparral and coastal scrub, particularly alluvial fan sage scrub, on flood deposited terraces and washes at elevations of approximately 650 to 2,500 feet. This species is associated with terraces or benches of mature alluvial scrub that receive infrequent overbank deposits. Slender-horned spineflower may occur in the project area where sandy benches have not been disturbed.</p>				
<p>The federally endangered <b>mountain yellow-legged frog (<i>Rana muscosa</i>)</b> is limited to the San Gabriel, San Bernardino, San Jacinto, and Palomar mountains. This species is often found along the sunny gravel banks of undisturbed mountain ponds, lakes, and streams. Populations of this species are known from higher elevations north and southeast of the proposed annexation area. Critical habitat for mountain yellow-legged frog has been proposed but does not include the annexation area. This species has a low potential for occurring in the project area.</p>				
<p>The proposed annexation would not result in any construction. Future projects in the annexation area would be subject to a separate CEQA evaluation to determine impacts to biological resources. For this reason, impacts to listed and sensitive species would be considered less than significant.</p>				

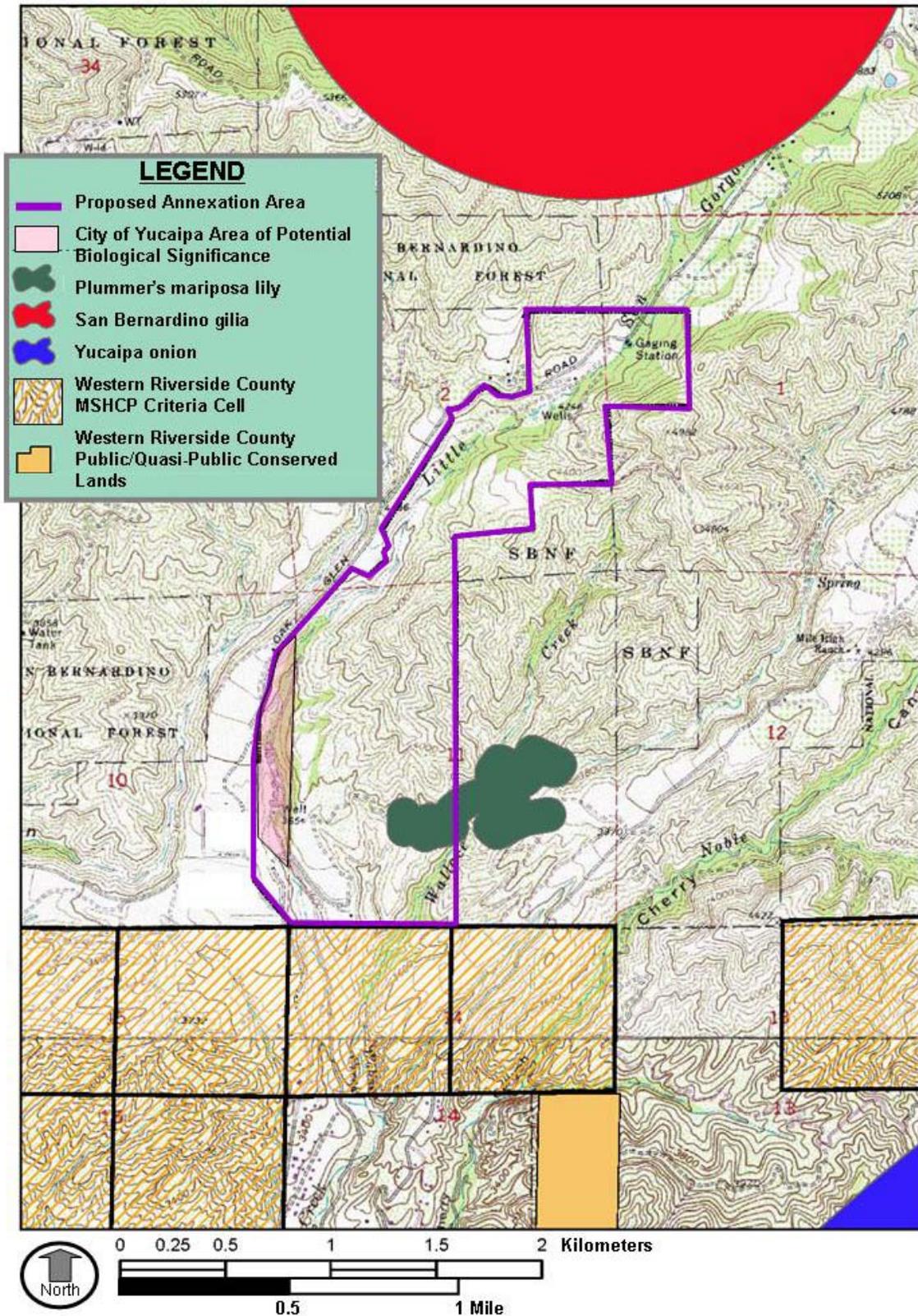


Figure 4. Sensitive Species and Conservation Areas in the Project Area

As also shown on Figure 4, the boundaries of the Western Riverside MSHCP extend to the boundary between Riverside and San Bernardino counties, and criteria cells have been designated on the northern edge of this plan area to the boundary of annexation Parcel No. 10. 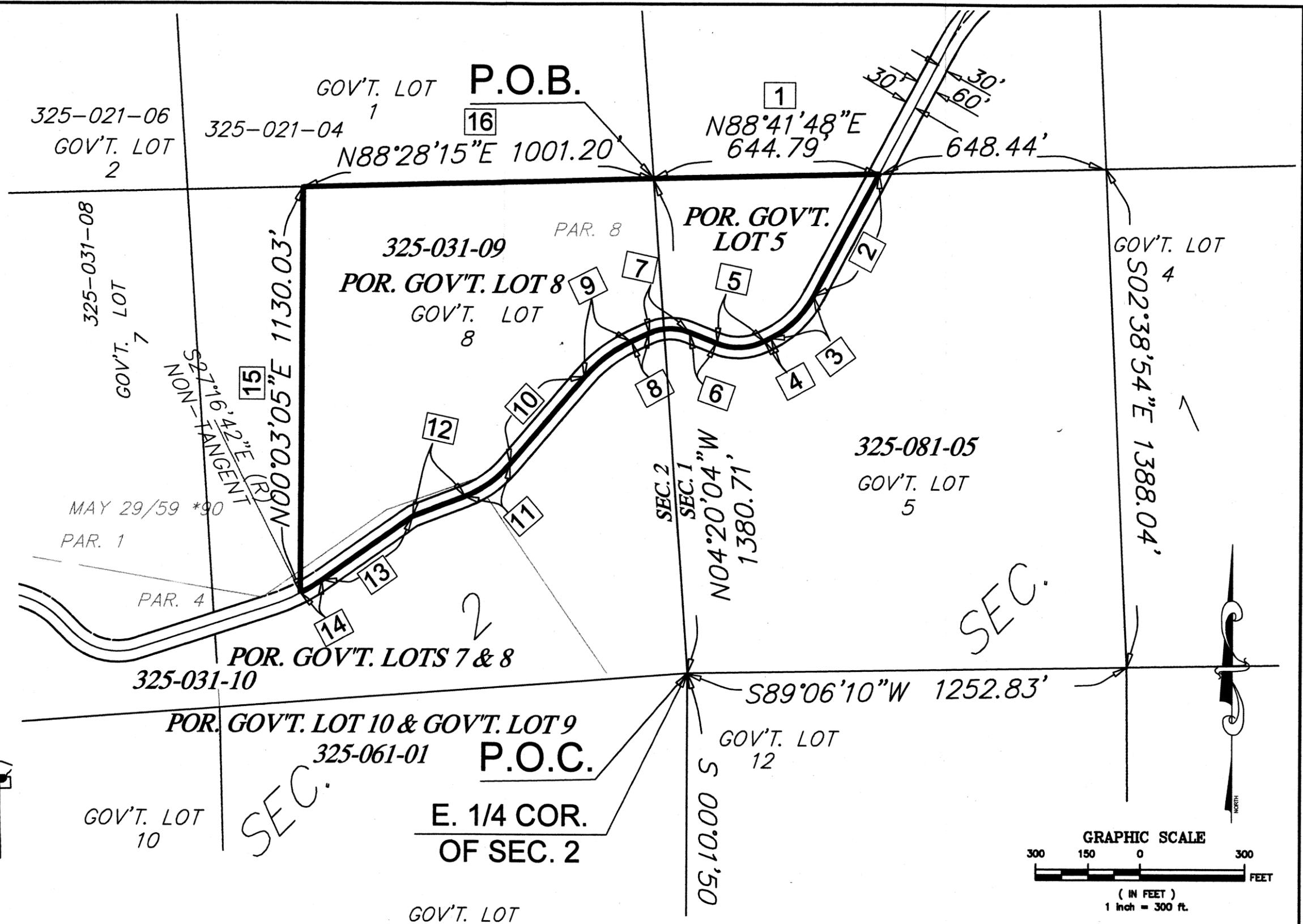

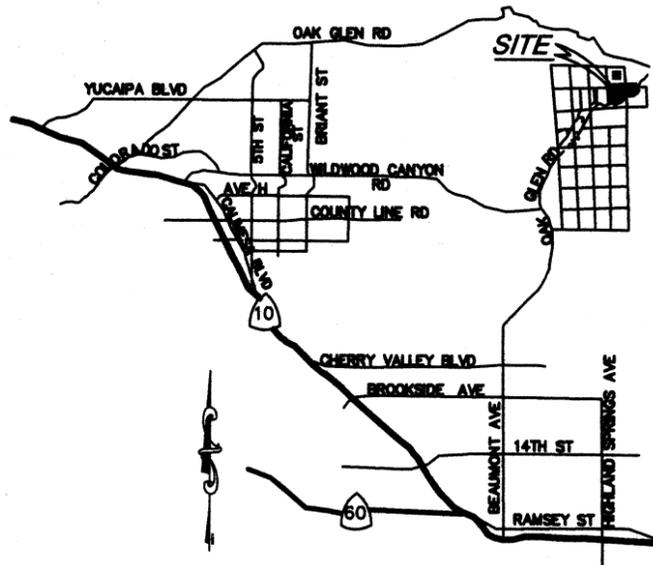

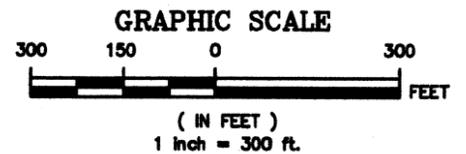

This will acknowledge receipt of the Water District's application for reorganization to include concurrent annexations to Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District of San Bernardino County properties.

A review of the application materials shows that the application is incomplete. This determination relates to language of Resolution 2007-06, which does not address the following issues:

- The third "Whereas" should be addressing whether or not the annexation application is consistent with the District's sphere of influence – which it is not. The information should state that a companion application to expand the Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District sphere and reduce the Yucaipa Valley Water District sphere is initiated by the Board of Directors of the Beaumont Cherry Valley Water District.
- The fifth "Whereas" is to state whether or not the area is "legally inhabited." The language should be clarified.
- On the sixth "Whereas" we are unclear as to this determination. The area proposed for reorganization is not currently a part of the San Gorgonio Pass Water Agency sphere of influence, but is a part of the San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District sphere. LAFCO staff will be expanding this application to include the annexation to San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District, as required by our Commission policies.
- The seventh "Whereas" should state the proposed terms and conditions desired by the District.
- The first "Whereas" on page two should identify the environmental determination made by the District.

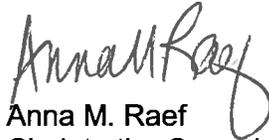

(5) Any other matters which the commission deems material.

(b) The commission shall give great weight to any resolution raising objections to the action that is filed by a city or a district. The commission's consideration shall be based only on financial or service related concerns expressed in the protest. Except for findings regarding the value of written protests, the commission is not required to make any express findings concerning any of the factors considered by the commission.

**Consideration of regional growth goals and policies**

**56668.5.** The commission may, but is not required to, consider the regional growth goals and policies established by a collaboration of elected officials only, formally representing their local jurisdictions in an official capacity on a regional or subregional basis. This section does not grant any new powers or authority to the commission or any other body to establish regional growth goals and policies independent of the powers granted by other laws.

**CHAPTER 2. FORM, FILING, AND CERTIFICATION OF PETITION**

**Proposal by petition; petition contents**

**56700.** (a) A proposal for a change of organization or a reorganization may be made by petition. The petition shall do all of the following:

- (1) State that the proposal is made pursuant to this part.
- (2) State the nature of the proposal and list all proposed changes of organization.
- (3) Set forth a description of the boundaries of affected territory accompanied by a map showing the boundaries.
- (4) Set forth any proposed terms and conditions.
- (5) State the reason or reasons for the proposal.
- (6) State whether the petition is signed by registered voters or owners of land.
- (7) Designate up to three persons as chief petitioners, setting forth their names and mailing addresses.
- (8) Request that proceedings be taken for the proposal pursuant to this part.
- (9) State whether the proposal is consistent with the sphere of influence of any affected city or affected district.

**Consolidation of special districts not formed pursuant to the same principal act; petition contents**

(b) A petition for a proposal for a change of organization or a reorganization that includes the consolidation of two or more special districts not formed pursuant to the same principal act, in addition to the requirements set forth in subdivision (a), shall do either of the following:

- (1) Designate the district that shall be the successor and specify under which principal act the successor shall conduct itself.

(2) State that the proposal requires the formation of a new district and includes a plan for services prepared pursuant to Section 56653.

(c) This section shall become inoperative on July 1, 2008, and, as of January 1, 2009, is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that becomes operative on or before January 1, 2009, deletes or extends the dates on which it becomes inoperative and is repealed.

**NOTE: Stats. 2004, Ch. 471, direct that on July 1, 2008, Sec. 56700 will become inoperative and replaced with the adjacent language.**

- (b) This section shall become operative on July 1, 2008.

**Disclosure of expenditures and contributions**

**56700.1.** Expenditures for political purposes related to a change of organization or reorganization proposal that has been submitted to a commission, and contributions in support of or in opposition to those measures, shall be disclosed and reported to the same extent and subject to the same requirements as provided for local initiative measures to be presented to the electorate.

**Notice of intent to circulate petition**

**56700.4.** (a) Before circulating any petition for change of organization, the proponent shall file with the executive officer a notice of intention that shall include the name and mailing address of the proponent and a written statement, not to exceed 500 words in length, setting forth the reasons for the proposal. Some years ago, the cities of Beaumont and Calimesa entered into litigation concerning boundaries. The settlement agreement included sewerage issues for the areas in dispute. Attached is an agreement between the two Cities related to sewerage and billing. The Sunlite Development areas were annexed in to the District several years ago and are now proceeding with their projects.

The Sunlite Development references the area along Champions and Desert Lawn Drive that they are planning to improve by constructing a 30 acre commercial center. As the Board can see in the letter they are asking that the District be the sewer bill collecting agent for the City of Beaumont. This can be done, however I think it would take an agreement with the City of Beaumont to provide the service.

**Recommendation:** Authorize staff to meet with the City of Beaumont for discussions concerning the two Cities agreement. Further authorize the staff to draft and agreement for collection of the cost for sewerage on the 30 acre parcel requested by the developer.

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE  
CITY OF BEAUMONT, THE CITY OF CALIMESA,  
OAK VALLEY PARTNERS, L.P., AND PARDEE CONSTRUCTION COMPANY  
REGARDING THE ANNEXATION OF THE  
OAK VALLEY SCPGA GOLF COURSE SPECIFIC PLAN AREA**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and effective by and between the CITY OF BEAUMONT ("Beaumont"), the CITY OF CALIMESA ("Calimesa"), OAK VALLEY PARTNERS, L.P. ("Oak Valley") and PARDEE CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, a California corporation ("Pardee"). Beaumont, Calimesa, Oak Valley and Pardee shall sometimes be collectively referred to as the "Parties".

**RECITALS**

A. Calimesa objects to Beaumont's pending Annexation No. 02-ANX-02, which provides for various actions involving a 1747.9 acre area known as the "Oak Valley SCPGA Golf Course Specific Plan" (Riverside County Specific Plan No. 318) to Beaumont (the "Project"). The Project is generally located on the southwest side of Interstate 10, north of San Timoteo Canyon Road/Oak Valley Parkway, within Beaumont's sphere of influence. Except for approximately 150 acres owned by Pardee, and 500 acres owned by the Southern California Section of the P.G.A., the Project is owned by Oak Valley.

B. The purpose of this Agreement is to resolve Calimesa's objections to Beaumont's pending annexation of the Project, and to avoid lengthy and costly litigation.

C. It is the desire of Oak Valley and Pardee that this Agreement be made so that their respective development plans can be implemented.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual terms, promises, covenants and conditions contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

**AGREEMENT**

**1. Beaumont Agrees as Follows:**

a. **Street Access and Alignment.** Beaumont shall provide, as part of the Project implementation, for access to properties within Calimesa that adjoin Desert Lawn Drive and Champions Drive, to Riverside County Standards. Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph 1.b. below, Calimesa agrees that Beaumont shall retain temporary jurisdiction to facilitate the review, approval, permitting and inspection of both sides of Champions Drive for the purpose of causing the intersection of Champions Drive and Desert Lawn Drive to be constructed as a "T" intersection.

b. **Remnant Parcel.** Beaumont shall remove from Annexation 02-ANX-02 the irregularly-shaped parcel of land, consisting of about 7.5 acres, situated west of Desert Lawn Drive and north of realigned Champions Drive, as shown on attached Exhibit "A", and shall further require, as a condition of development of the Project, the dedication to Calimesa of the Desert Lawn Drive and Champions Drive right-of-way indicated on Exhibit "A". Beaumont shall not object to Calimesa's annexation of that property to Calimesa.

c. **Extraterritorial Sewer Service.** Plantation on the Lakes Mobilehome Park (APN 406-050-018, the "Mobilehome Park") and the commercial area adjacent thereto (APN 406-050-002, 406-050-003, 406-050-004, 406-050-019, 406-050-020, APN 406-050-021 and APN 407-230-010, hereafter collectively referred to as the "Commercial Area") are not presently served with off-site wastewater treatment and disposal. Beaumont owns and operates a community wastewater collection, treatment and disposal system. Beaumont agrees to provide wastewater treatment and disposal service to the Mobilehome Park and the Commercial Area as follows:

i. As private development progresses and a trunk main is built to the Beaumont city boundary where it adjoins the Mobilehome Park, Beaumont shall cause to be provided a sewer pipeline stub-out to the southerly boundary of the Mobilehome Park.

ii. Once the sewer stub-out is available and provided LAFCO approves, the Mobilehome Park and the Commercial Area may connect and obtain sewer service from Beaumont at the Commercial Area's and the Mobilehome Park's sole cost and expense and in accordance with Beaumont's rules and regulations governing sewer service in effect at the time of such connection.

d. **Split of Sales Tax Revenue.** Beaumont shall share with Calimesa, on a 50/50 basis, gross sales tax revenue generated by all commercial development within the Project during the 15-year period commencing July 1, 2003 and ending June 30, 2018. Payment of Calimesa's share of sales tax revenue received by Beaumont shall be made within 60 days of receipt thereof from the State Board of Equalization. Beaumont shall provide Calimesa with a statement of account upon request of Calimesa.

e. **Split of Transient Occupancy Tax.** Beaumont shall share with Calimesa, on a 50/50 basis, gross transient occupancy tax ("TOT") revenue generated by all hotel and motel development within the Project, commencing with the issuance of the first certificate of occupancy for a hotel or motel business and for up to 15 years thereafter, but under no circumstances and in no event shall Beaumont share any TOT revenue with Calimesa after June 30, 2028. Payment of Calimesa's share of TOT revenue received by Beaumont shall be made within 60 days of the conclusion of any period of reporting and payment of such taxes by the affected businesses. Beaumont shall provide Calimesa with a statement of account upon request by Calimesa.

f. **Residential Building Permit Surcharge.** Concurrently with the issuance of each original residential building permit within the Project, Beaumont shall levy and collect a \$100.00 Residential Building Permit Surcharge from Oak Valley and Pardee and their respective successors and assigns. Beaumont shall remit to Calimesa all Surcharge monies collected in any quarterly period not later than 90 days following the end of each respective quarter.

g. **Additional Payments.** In addition to the Residential Building Permit Surcharge, a total of \$100,000.00 shall be delivered to Beaumont by Oak Valley and Pardee and forwarded to Calimesa in accordance with Paragraphs 3.b. and 4.c. below.

2. **Calimesa Agrees as Follows:**

a. Calimesa shall not challenge, object to, or otherwise contest Beaumont's approval and development of the Project or the proposed annexation of the Project to Beaumont.

b. Calimesa shall withdraw LAFCO Application No. 1998-08-3.

c. Calimesa shall not cooperate with, assist, support, abet, knowingly confer with or otherwise accommodate any person or entity proposing to challenge or otherwise contest Beaumont's approval and development of the Project or the proposed annexation of the Project to Beaumont.

3. **Oak Valley Agrees as Follows:**

a. **Obligation to Pay Residential Building Permit Surcharge.** Concurrently with the issuance of each original residential building permit for a residential lot within the Project (excepting that portion of the Project owned by Pardee), Oak Valley hereby agrees, for itself and for its successors and assigns, to pay to Beaumont the \$100.00 Residential Building Permit Surcharge.

b. **Obligation to Pay Additional Payments.** In addition to the Residential Building Permit Surcharge, Oak Valley agrees for itself, and for its successors and assigns, to pay additional payments totalling \$75,000.00. Payment of this sum shall be made and delivered in four installments to Beaumont as follows: \$18,750.00 upon the expiration of the statute of limitations for challenging LAFCO's approval of the annexation to the Project to Beaumont, or, if a challenge, claim or lawsuit is filed within the statute of limitations, upon final resolution of such challenge, claim or lawsuit (the "First Payment"); \$18,750.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the First Payment (the "Second Payment"); \$18,750.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the Second Payment (the "Third Payment"); \$18,750.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the Third Payment (the "Fourth Payment"). Upon receipt of each Payment, Beaumont shall, within ten (10) days of receipt, remit each Payment to Calimesa.

c. **Indemnification.** To fully indemnify, to the maximum extent permitted by law, Beaumont and Calimesa against, and hold each of them and their respective employees and agents completely free and harmless from, any cost, expense, claim, demand, judgment, loss, injury and/or liability of any kind or nature, asserted or otherwise, whether in contract or tort, that may arise, directly or indirectly, from, or be occasioned by, or be in any way connected with Oak Valley's performance and/or failure to perform under this Agreement.

4. **Pardee Agrees as Follows:**

a. **Access and Dedication of Right-of-Way.** Pardee is the owner of the property depicted on Exhibit "A" hereto. In accordance with the provisions of Paragraphs 1.a and 1.b. above, Pardee shall provide access and dedicate to Calimesa for public right-of-way and utility purposes that portion of the property indicated on Exhibit "A" which is necessary for the realignment and improvement of Champions Drive and Desert Lawn Drive.

b. **Residential Building Permit Surcharge.** Concurrently with the issuance of each original residential building permit for a residential lot within its portion of the Project, Pardee hereby agrees, for itself and for its successors and assigns, to pay to Beaumont the \$100.00 Residential Building Permit Surcharge.

c. **Obligation to Pay Additional Payments.** In addition to the Residential Building Permit Surcharge, Pardee agrees for itself, and for its successors and assigns, to pay additional payments totalling \$25,000.00. Payment of this sum shall be made and delivered in four installments to Beaumont as follows: \$6,250.00 upon the expiration of the statute of limitations for challenging LAFCO's approval of the annexation to the Project to Beaumont, or, if a challenge, claim or lawsuit is filed within the statute of limitations, upon final resolution of such challenge, claim or lawsuit (the "First Payment"); \$6,250.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the First Payment (the "Second Payment"); \$6,250.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the Second Payment (the "Third Payment"); \$6,250.00 upon expiration of 90 days following the Third Payment (the "Fourth Payment"). Upon receipt of each Payment, Beaumont shall, within ten (10) days of receipt, remit each Payment to Calimesa.

d. **Indemnification.** To fully indemnify, to the maximum extent permitted by law, Beaumont and Calimesa against, and hold each of them and their respective employees and agents completely free and harmless from, any cost, expense, claim, demand, judgment, loss, injury and/or liability of any kind or nature, asserted or otherwise, whether in contract or tort, that may arise, directly or indirectly, from, or be occasioned by, or be in any way connected, with Pardee's performance and/or failure to perform under this Agreement.

5. **Enforcement of Obligations.**

a. **Automatic Nullity.** This Agreement shall become automatically null and void, without further notice or liability, in the event Calimesa or anyone successfully

challenges or otherwise successfully contests Beaumont's approval and development of the Project or the proposed annexation of the Project to Beaumont.

b. **Waiver.** Any waiver by one of the Parties of any breach of any one or more of the terms of this Agreement shall not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach. No provision of this Agreement may be waived unless in writing and signed by the Parties.

c. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect.

d. **Dispute Resolution.**

i. The Parties will attempt in good faith to resolve promptly any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Agreement or any claimed breach thereof (collectively, "dispute") by direct negotiation between the respective City Managers and the senior executives of the non-municipal Parties who have authority to settle the dispute.

ii. The disputing Party shall give the other Party or Parties written notice of the dispute. Within ten (10) calendar days after notice is given, the Party receiving the notice shall respond to the notice in writing, or, if the dispute has not been resolved, the negotiating Parties shall meet at a mutually acceptable time and place, and thereafter as often as those negotiators reasonably deem necessary, to exchange relevant information and attempt to resolve the dispute.

iii. If the dispute has not been resolved within thirty (30) days after the disputing Party gives notice, or if the Party receiving notice refuses to meet, either Party may initiate mediation of the dispute in accordance with the rules and procedures of the Judicial Arbitration and Mediation Service ("JAMS"), with each Party to bear its own attorneys' fees and costs of the mediation.

iv. If the dispute has not been resolved within sixty (60) days after a Party has given notice of intent to initiate mediation or either Party will not participate in the mediation, or if the mediator has concluded that the Parties are at impasse, whichever shall happen first, the dispute may be resolved by legal action.

v. If legal action is brought by any Party against the other arising from any dispute the prevailing Party shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs.

6. **Rescission of Cooperative Agreement.** Beaumont and Calimesa hereby rescind that certain Cooperative Agreement between them dated July 23, 1997.

7. **No Third Party Beneficiaries.** Nothing in this Agreement, expressed or implied, is intended to confer any rights or remedies upon any person other than Calimesa and Beaumont.

8. **Further Documents.** Provided that it is reasonable and necessary to carry out the provisions of this Agreement, each Party to this Agreement, for itself and for its successors and assigns, agrees to execute or deliver any instrument (in recordable form, if required).

9. **Integration.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between and among the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. There are no oral understandings, terms, conditions or promises, and none of the Parties have relied upon any representation, expressed or implied, not contained in this Agreement. This Agreement may only be modified or amended in writing and must be signed by each of the Parties.

10. **Costs and Fees.** The Parties shall bear their own costs and fees incurred to date in connection with the subject matter of this Agreement.

11. **Authorization to Sign.** The undersigned individuals, signing on behalf of Oak Valley and Pardee, hereby warrant and represent that they are duly and lawfully authorized to sign this Agreement and to bind Oak Valley, and its successors and assigns, and Pardee and its successors and assigns, to all of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement. They further specifically acknowledge and agree that this Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective successors and assigns.

12. **Execution.** Four originals of this Agreement shall be executed by the Parties, so that each Party shall be entitled to retain an original signed Agreement. This Agreement shall not be executed in counterparts.

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## MEMORANDUM

**Subject:** Sylvia and Danny Kohler Claim

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The claim was filed following a suit in Small Claims Court that was dismissed because the claim was not filed in accordance with the California State Government Code commencing at Section 900. The pipeline in question does run in the back yard in a blanket easement over the property in question. Attached is an aerial photo (please excuse the quality) that shows the house with the main running east or in back of the house.

This particular 8" pipeline located in the Mesa Miravilla area is an important main that attaches the well 4A Emergency Booster to the Upper Edgar distribution system. When it is necessary to operate, the booster pumps water through this line to the Upper Edgar Reservoir which is important as it is the only way to reach the reservoir from well 4A without purchasing several thousand feet of easement to relocate the line. It also acts as a distribution line for a number of residences in the area near the Kohler's property.

The Mesa area actually contains all easement mains. The water system that was built to serve this area was placed in easements as it made it more practical to serve the orchards and residents rather than placing mains in the narrow curvy dirt roads that prevailed in the area. As residences were built in the area during the early to middle Twentieth Century some houses were built, some were built very close to the pipelines. However the District lines were in place first and the improvements, e.g. houses etc., and were added later with the property owner presumably knowing the mains were in place.

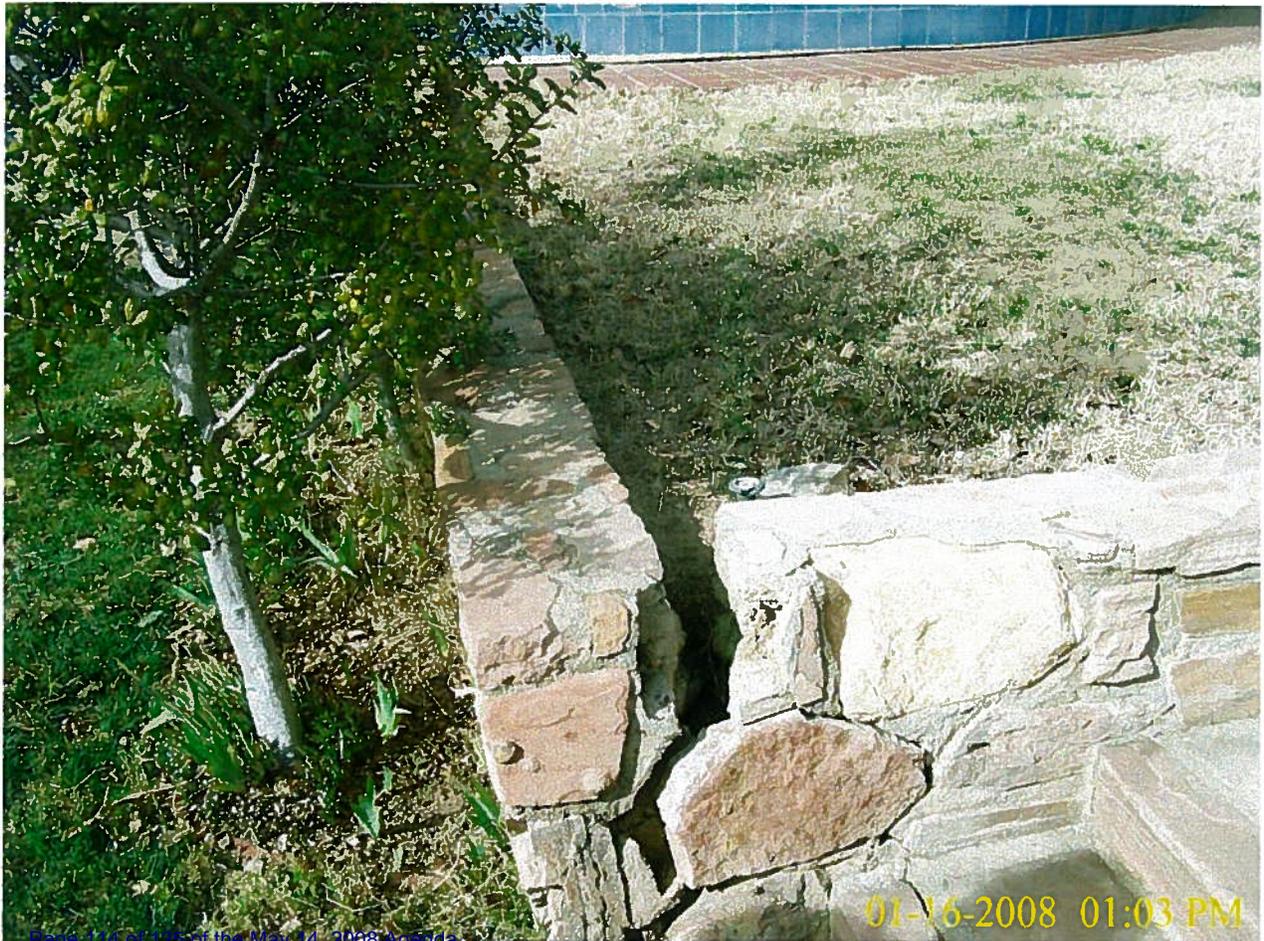
The Kohler's claim states "With the prior leak at the same area, the retaining wall began to shift, and with the new damage and erosion, the wall is tilting and shifting more". Attached are three photographs showing the damage that the claimant says is caused by leaks that occurred in the 8" pipeline. Staff has combined these photos which actually were taken both in 2007 and 2008 showing that no damage is apparent from the second leak in 2008.

I am also attaching Government Code Section 911.2 that states "A claim relating to a cause of action for death or for injury to person or to personal property or growing crops shall be presented as provided in Article 2 (commencing with Section 915) not later than six months after the accrual of the cause of action".

**Recommendation:** Based on the photographs indicating the damages claimed occurred sometime before the January 2008 and the February 2007 leaks, the Government Code states personal property damage claims must be presented “not later than 6 months after the accrual of the cause of action”







911.2. (a) A claim relating to a cause of action for death or for injury to person or to personal property or growing crops shall be presented as provided in Article 2 (commencing with Section 915) not later than six months after the accrual of the cause of action. A claim relating to any other cause of action shall be presented as provided in Article 2 (commencing with Section 915) not later than one year after the accrual of the cause of action.

(b) For purposes of determining whether a claim was commenced within the period provided by law, the date the claim was presented to the California Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board is one of the following:

(1) The date the claim is submitted with a twenty-five dollar (\$25) filing fee.

(2) If a fee waiver is granted, the date the claim was submitted with the affidavit requesting the fee waiver.

(3) If a fee waiver is denied, the date the claim was submitted with the affidavit requesting the fee waiver, provided the filing fee is paid to the board within 10 calendar days of the mailing of the notice of the denial of the fee waiver.

Reference is made to our conversation on April 14, 2008 regarding a claim with the Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District. You gave me a copy of the government code on this matter. It states a claim form provided by your Government Claims Board must be completed. However, you said you did not have a claim form and that your lawyer would need to a few days to draw one up. In lieu of no form available at this time, you asked me to state in this claim that you would accept this claim as presented. I am abiding by the information required under California code 910.0 by supplying the following information:

A. Name and post office address:

B. Post office address the claimant info to be sent: same as above

C. The date, place and circumstances of occurrence giving rise to claim:

On January 9, 2008 between 2 and 3 pm we called the water district about two water main leaks in our yard, one approximately 5 feet from our den and one approximately 16 feet from our bedroom. The following day the leaks were repaired. Although we have had many water main leaks over the years, now the areas affected are greater and now they are occurring at the same time. The distance between the two leaks is approximately 50 feet. There is an elevation drop between these two areas and a 3-foot flagstone retaining wall separates the two leak areas. The retaining wall has been damaged and is tilting. With a prior leak at the same area, the retaining wall began to shift, and with this new damage and erosion, the wall is tilting and shifting more.

With all past leaks, the repair hole would be left open for day or two, so the soil would dry and would stabilize. Then it would be refilled. This January 2008 leak, the wet soil was immediately replaced. Subsequently the rounded patio where a marble bench sits cracked further and the retaining wall shifted. The marble bench is heavy and with this recent leak coming just a few months after a previous leak, there is concern the bench will be irreparably damaged

should the retaining wall come down or the soil continue to shift. Furthermore, should the retaining wall fall or shift further it could damage the foundation to our home.

The water district was contacted regarding the uneven soil and clumpy sod after the repair and on January 14, 2008, Eric and another worker brought sand and sod for both areas. However, a portion was not leveled. We were told if was sand left over, they would bring it and they did not. This has not been repaired.

There are three water main leak areas in this 50-foot span. Since purchasing our home in 1989, there have been at least nine leaks and on occasion, two leaks in the same area. The first leak in the early 1990's caused a huge waterspout rising over 20 ft into the air. (At that time we were told the water main was 10 inches od. Subsequently we learned pipe size by our bedroom is 8.65 od and by the den is 8.25 od.) On another occasion, there was a similar waterspout from another leak. A repairman told us the January 2008 water main leak by our bedroom was partially because screws on repair bands were not tightened previously. In January 2008, Jason told us the regulator on the Wilson property (adjacent to ours) may not be working well. It appears this 50-foot section of water main has been demonstrated to be of inferior quality or has not been maintained adequately.

D. A general description of the indebtedness, obligation, damage and loss so far as may be known:

Damage to 3-foot high flagstone-concrete retaining wall, damage to round tiled patio, damage and a sinking of tiled sidewalks behind home, erosion and uneven grading in areas affected by flooding and leaking water main. Exterior wall of home damaged by leaking water that separated the tiled sidewalk from the home.

E. Name or names of public employees causing injury, damage or loss if known.

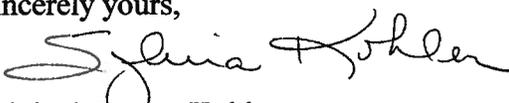
No names are known of employees causing injury, damage or loss. In the repair of the leak in January 2008, we were told the screws had not been tightened on the band previously.

F. The amount claimed if it totals less that \$10,000.

The amount claimed is more that \$10,000. This claim will be limited to a civil case.

We look forward to presenting our case before the board on May 14, 2008.

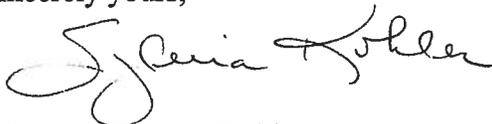

Thank you for your letter regarding your views on water quality in Cherry Valley. While we disagree on a number of important facts and issues, I share your concern regarding water quality and safety. To that end we have worked collectively as a team to ensure that we address issues of concern raised in your correspondence.

After carefully reading your letter, I asked the County Department of Environmental Health to evaluate the "Water Quality Impacts in the Cherry Valley Community of Interest." As you know this body of work was prepared by Wildermuth Environmental. The department's own review was extensive, accurate, and factual, and found the work product "credible and that it identified a number of water quality concerns related to the use of individual waste disposal systems in Cherry Valley." Further, the department found no fault with the study, or the merits thereof, to serve as a guideline and or bench mark for managing the elevated nitrate problem in Cherry Valley well water supply. As a courtesy, for your review and records, I have provided that letter as an attachment to my response.

To ensure accuracy and seek yet another opinion regarding the report issued by Wildermuth, I also submitted a request to the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) to evaluate the validity of the report on scientific merit and methodology. As you know RWQCB is the state entity responsible for preserving, enhancing and restoring the quality of California's water resources, and ensuring their proper allocation and efficient use for the benefit of present and future generations.

Upon receipt of my request the review was assigned to Cindy Li, Ph.D., an engineering geologist for the board. In their response, the RWQCB stated, "Dr. Li found the report to be credible and that it identified a number of water quality concerns related to the use of individual water disposal systems in the Cherry Valley area." To address these concerns the County of Riverside Board of Supervisors, and by my direction, The Environmental Health Department brought forth County Ordinance 871 "Ordinance of the County of Riverside Prohibiting the Installation of Specified Septic Tank Systems in Cherry Valley." As a courtesy and for your review and records, I have provided that Ordinance as an attachment to my response.

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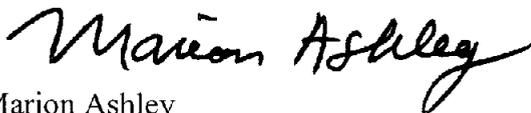
The RWQCB also commented, "We are supportive of efforts by Riverside County staff to respond to the concerns identified by the Wildermuth Environmental report, and we look forward to continued cooperation between the County and the Regional Board in this matter."

Recent reports of pharmaceuticals in Riverside County's water supply only emphasize the need for our region to bolster measures to protect our precious ground water supply and improve water quality. As a courtesy and for your review and records, I have attached a Press Enterprise Article, Dated March 11, 2008. This feature article reflects the concerns not only of men and women who have devoted their life work to ensuring our water supply is safe, but reflects the concerns by our federal leaders in our nation's capital regarding this issue. It is therefore imperative that we rely on experts to provide guidance utilizing proven scientific methods and practices. I am satisfied with the finding of the Wildermuth report and reviews provided by two additional professional agencies.

I believe the issue at hand is of such importance to our residents that I will ask my colleagues, on the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, to formally authorize and appoint a "Blue Ribbon" panel of experts that will focus on this issue and bring forth recommendations which may lead to resolution of the issue at hand.

Again, thank you for your letter and for sharing your views and opinions with me regarding the water quality in Cherry Valley.
