

2022 **CALIFORNIA DROUGHT** RESPONSE

Important information about water restrictions





STATE OF CALIFORNIA DROUGHT MANDATES

The entire state is facing extreme drought, and many areas do not have the water needed to meet demand. In response, the State Water Resources Control Board, under Governor Gavin Newsom's Executive Order, adopted water conservation measures starting June 10, 2022.

The orders require water providers like Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District (BCVWD) to implement water restrictions that address a shortage of 10% to 20% and are appropriate for local water conditions.

Under the state order, irrigation of decorative turf not used for recreation or other community purposes is prohibited. The regulations are in effect for one year, unless changed by the State Water Resources Control Board.

BCVWD is dedicated to ensuring dependable delivery of water to our customers, and our supply remains stable. However, it is imperative that we use water as efficiently as possible to mitigate drought impacts and support a sustainable water future.

Did you know?

Under the state's emergency regulations, water suppliers are allowed to continue issuing new residential meters as a way to help address California's housing supply shortage.





Protecting water resources is up to all of us and we need your help!

In response to state conservation orders, BCVWD activated Stage 3 of its Water Shortage Contingency Plan to sustain the Beaumont Basin, which provides water to District customers. In addition to requiring a 20% reduction in use, BCVWD is implementing penalties for non-compliance.

OUTDOOR WATERING



Watering of residential lawns, parks, sports fields, schools and grass used for recreational purposes or community events is currently limited between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.

May - October: watering is limited to three days per week: Monday, Wednesday and Friday for addresses ending in an odd number or meters without a physical address, and Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday for addresses ending in an even number.



November - April: watering is limited to two days per week: Monday and Friday for addresses ending in odd numbers, and Tuesday and Saturday for even numbers.



Watering of decorative, non-functional turf at commercial, industrial and institutional locations, including HOAs, is prohibited by order of the State Water Resources Control Board.

ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS



Filling of new swimming pools is prohibited. Topping off existing pools is permitted; homeowners associations and community pools must take steps to minimize the draining and refilling of pools.



Restaurants may only serve water upon request.



Lodging facilities must provide guests with the option to decline linen services and display the option clearly in each room.



Construction meters will be conditionally approved under certain circumstances.



EXISTING STATEWIDE CONSERVATION MEASURES

The new restrictions build upon statewide efficiency initiatives already in place that prohibit:



Outdoor watering during and within 48 hours of measurable rainfall.



Runoff from outdoor watering onto hard surfaces and non-irrigated areas.



The use of drinking water for:

- Washing cars with a hose that does not have a shutoff nozzle.
- Hosing down sidewalks, driveways, patios or other hard surfaces.
- Decorative fountains or filling/topping off ponds or lakes.
- Street cleaning or construction site preparation, unless necessary to protect public health and safety.



receive a written

notice, followed by increasing financial penalties equal to 10%, 20%, 30% and 50% of the customer's water bill. Violations after the fifth notice are subject to suspension or termination of water service.

Actions prohibited by the State Water Resources Control Board are subject to a fine of up to \$500 for each day the violation occurs.
